WHAT IF IT'S TRUE...

THAT JESUS IS WHO HE CLAIMED TO BE?

For 2,000 years, much of the world has seen Jesus of Nazareth as the founder of one of the world's major religions. Many have also seen Him as a provocative teacher and good moral example.

But history doesn't give us the luxury of thinking that Jesus was merely a great teacher or good moral example. The evidence suggests that if He was not who He claimed to be, then Jesus was guilty of crimes against humanity. If He wasn't speaking on behalf of our Creator, then He was either a very sick or evil man.

So, what were Jesus' claims?

JESUS CLAIMED TO BE MORE THAN A MAN

In chapter 8 of John's gospel, we find Jesus confronted by religious leaders of His day. In the course of the debate He claimed to know God in a way that they did not. Reflecting Jesus' claim and their resulting rage, the text quotes Jesus as saying, "Most assuredly, I say to you, before Abraham was, I AM." Then they took up stones to throw at Him" (John 8:58-59).

Regarding Jesus' willingness to describe Himself as more than a man, Thomas Schultz wrote:

Not one recognized religious leader – not Moses, Paul, Buddha, Mohammed, Confucius... ever claimed to be God; that is, with the exception of Jesus Christ. Christ is the only religious leader who has ever claimed to be deity, and the only individual ever who has convinced a great portion of the world that He is God.

Is that possible? What's the proof? What's the evidence that this great spiritual leader really was God?

The four Gospel writers (Matthew, Mark, Luke and John) provide different perspectives but a shared conclusion that the overall pattern of Jesus' life is unexplainable if He wasn't who He claimed to be. They say that in addition to fulfilling prophecy and living a life of unparalleled wisdom and character, Jesus performed...

- **Miracles of physical healing:** He healed a man with a terrible skin disease (Matthew 8:2-4); reversed paralysis (Matthew 9:2-8; 12:10-13); and cured blindness and deafness (Matthew 20:30-34; Mark 7:31-37) – to name just a few.
- **Miracles of nature:** He turned water into wine (John 2:1-11); stilled a storm on the Sea of Galilee (Matthew 8:23-27); and walked on water (Matthew 14:22-26) – again to name a few).
- **Miracles of resurrection:** He raised the dead daughter of a religious leader (Matthew 9:18-26), a widow's dead son (Luke 7:11-15), and a friend named Lazarus who had died (John 11:1-44).

How is such a life to be weighed 2,000 years later? One thing is clear. Jesus' life had a profound effect not only on contemporaries who were willing to die for Him, but on the whole course of history.

According to William Robinson:

If one takes a historically objective approach to the question, it is found that even secular history affirms that Jesus lived on earth and was worshiped as God. He founded a church that has worshiped Him for 1,900 years. He changed the course of the world's history (*Our Lord*, p. 29).

JESUS CLAIMED TO BE A SAVIOR

According to each of the four written records of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John, Jesus repeatedly talked about being on a mission of rescue. Even as His popularity began to worry the religious leaders of Israel, He talked repeatedly about going to Jerusalem to die. His followers found such comments unthinkable. Yet after only 3 years in the public eye, He went to Jerusalem, was rejected by national leaders, and was sentenced to die by crucifixion for claiming to be the King and God of the Jews.

Only after His execution would followers see His willingness to die in the light of a comment made by His forerunner. Three years earlier they heard a rugged prophet of the wilderness, known as John the baptizer, say about Jesus, "Behold! The Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world!" (John 1:29).

In retrospect, it seems reasonable to conclude that Jesus saw Himself as a sacrificial lamb. For thousands of years the religious law of Israel had been requiring the death of innocent animals on altars of sacrifice. All the while, mysterious statements of Jewish prophets referred to a Messiah who would Himself bear the sin of fallen humanity. Yet the meaning of a suffering Messiah (Genesis 3:15; Isaiah 53; Daniel 9:26; Zechariah 12:10) would remain a mystery until after the death of Jesus.

According to hundreds of eyewitnesses, Jesus did die – and 3 days later He left the tomb alive. Also consider the following evidence:

- Secular historians acknowledge that Jesus was a real living person who gained renown in first-century Israel as a healer and a teacher.
- Secular historians (Jewish and Roman) acknowledge that Jesus died at the hands of religious leaders.
- The biblical record tells us that Jesus was seen alive by more than 500 people after His death.
- If He was to save us from our sins, God's plan for salvation would have to be achieved – and in the crucifixion and resurrection, dozens of Old Testament prophecies of God' plan for providing forgiveness were fulfilled in the space of just a few hours.

In all of these amazing events, Jesus Himself doesn't make it easy for us. When He said, "I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through Me" (John 14:6), He didn't leave us with many options. He does not allow us to think that He was just "a good teacher" or "a moral model."

C.S. Lewis, Cambridge University professor and former atheist, observed with his usual candor:

I am trying here to prevent anyone saying the really foolish thing that people often say about Him: "I am ready to accept Jesus as a great

moral teacher, but I don't accept His claim to be God." That is the one thing we must not say. A man who was merely a man and said the sort of things Jesus said would not be a great moral teacher. He would either be a lunatic – on a level with the man who says he is a poached egg – or else He would be the devil of hell. You must make your choice. Either this man was, and is, the Son of God – or else a madman or something worse. You can shut Him up for a fool; you can spit at Him and kill Him as a demon; or you can fall at His feet and call Him Lord and God. But let us not come up with any patronizing nonsense about His being a great human teacher. He has not left that open to us. He did not intend to (*Mere Christianity*).

He was and is the second person of the Trinity – the Son of God, our Savior, our Redeemer, and our coming King.

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THE EMPTY CHAIR

"A man's daughter had asked the local minister to come and pray with her father. When the minister arrived, he found the man lying in bed with his head propped up on two pillows. An empty chair sat beside his bed. The minister assumed that the old fellow had been informed of his visit. 'I guess you were expecting me,' he said. 'No, who are you?' said the father.

The minister told him his name and then remarked, 'I see the empty chair; I figured you knew I was going to show up.' 'Oh yeah, the chair,' said the bed-ridden man. 'Would you mind closing the door?' Puzzled, the minister shut the door. 'I have never told anyone this, not even my daughter,' said the man. 'But all of my life I have never known how to pray. At church I used to hear the pastor talk about prayer, but it went right over my head. I abandoned any attempt at prayer,' the old man continued, 'until one day about four years ago my best friend said to me, 'Johnny, prayer is just a simple matter of having a conversation with Jesus. Here is what I suggest. Sit down in a chair; place an empty chair in front of you, and in faith see Jesus on the chair. It's not spooky because he promised, 'I'll be with you always.' Then just speak to him in the same way you're doing with me right now.'

'So, I tried it and I've liked it so much that I do it a couple of hours every day. I'm careful though. If my daughter saw me talking to an empty chair, she'd either have a nervous breakdown or send

me off to the funny farm. The minister was deeply moved by the story and encouraged the old man to continue on the journey. Then he prayed with him, anointed him with oil, and returned to the church.

Two nights later the daughter called to tell the minister that her daddy had died that afternoon. 'Did he die in peace?' he asked. 'Yes, and when I left the house about two o'clock, he called me over to his bedside and told me he loved me and kissed me on the cheek. When I got back from the store an hour later, I found him dead. But there was something strange about his death. Apparently, just before Daddy died, he leaned over and rested his head on the chair beside the bed. What do you make of that?' The minister wiped a tear from his eye and said, 'I wish we could all go like that.'

I DO, I DO

Wives and husbands, did you ever stop to think, "What is marriage for?"

Is it a contract, a business deal, a place to raise children? Is it to make us happy? Is it to make us miserable? Perhaps all of these, or none of them. The Scriptures reveal what it really is. Paul, in Ephesians 5, tells us that marriage involves a "profound mystery." This astonishing mystery is that marriages, our marriages, are a picture of a heavenly reality. This reality is the intensely intimate way in which Jesus Christ loves us, his people, his church.

If the purpose of marriage is to illuminate such a "profound mystery," then, husbands and wives, is your marriage accomplishing its purpose? Your answer, probably, is no, not exactly, not as well as it should. Husbands, do something today to lavish love upon your wife. Wives, be deliberate today to speak words of encouragement and respect to your husband. You will have taken a step forward in fulfilling God's purpose for your marriage. Your marriage will begin to reflect our God's intensely relational character.

ARE YOU A CRACKED POT?

A water bearer in India had two large pots, each hung on the end of a pole which he carried across his back. One of the pots had a crack in it, and while the other pot was perfect and always delivered a full portion of water at the end of the long walk from the stream to the master's house, the cracked pot arrived only half full. For a full two years this went on daily, with the bearer delivering only one and a half pots full of water in his master's house. Of course, the perfect pot was proud of its accomplishments, perfect to the end for which it was made. But the poor cracked pot was ashamed of its own imperfection, and miserable that it was able to accomplish only half of what it had been made to do.

After two years of what it perceived to be a bitter failure, it spoke to the water bearer one day by the stream. "I am ashamed of myself, and I want to apologize to you." "Why?" asked the bearer. "What are you ashamed of?" "I have been able, for these past two years, to deliver only half my load because this crack in my side causes water to leak out all the way back to your master's house. Because of my flaws, you have to do all of this work, and you don't get full value from your efforts," the pot said.

The water bearer felt sorry for the old cracked pot, and in his compassion he said, "As we return to the master's house, I want you to notice the beautiful flowers along the path." Indeed, as they went up the hill, the old cracked pot took notice of the sun warming the beautiful wild flowers on the side of the path, and this cheered it some. But at the end of the trail, it still felt bad because it had leaked out half its load, and so again, it apologized to the bearer for its failure.

The bearer said to the pot, "Did you notice that there were flowers only on your side of the path, but not on the other pot's side? That's because I have always known about your flaw, and I took advantage of it. I planted flower seeds on your side of the path and everyday while we walked back from the stream, you've watered them. For two years I have been able to pick these beautiful flowers to decorate my master's table. Without you being just the way you are, he would not have this beauty to grace his house."

Each of us has our own unique flaws. We are all cracked pots. But if we allow Him, the Lord will use our flaws to grace His Father's table. In God's great economy, nothing goes to waste. So, as we seek ways to minister together, and as God calls you to the tasks He has appointed for you, don't be afraid of your flaws. Acknowledge them and allow Him to take advantage of them, and you, too, can be the cause of beauty in His pathway.

RULES TO LIVE BY

1. Follow the Golden Rule and Be a Friend – develop the qualities you are looking for, and as like attracts like, you will soon find those qualities in others.

2. Obey the “One Another” Commands of God – It is impossible for me to fulfill the commands of Scripture without being in significant relationships with one another.

3. Seize the “Teachable Moments” in your Life – We are most teachable in times of crisis, when we feel inadequate, when confronted with a need, challenged by a goal, or searching for meaning.

4. Acknowledge your Need of Others – Unless you acknowledge this need for other people in your life, you will never pursue positive nurturing relationships.

5. Appreciate and Accept the Differences of Others – The differences between people are what make relationships special and powerful, and give you a deeper appreciation for what is important in life.

6. Devote yourself to People – Don’t fall into the trap for viewing a close relationship as a means rather than an end – such a shifting of focus will jeopardize the relationship.

7. Band Together in Small Groups for “PPP” (prayer, pages of Scripture, and pain) – When you are committed to keeping your promises and are willing to take the risk of being a friend, you are ready for a meaningful mentoring relationship.

I want to encourage you to seek out someone to “hold your feet to the fire” in a spiritual sense. It is not easy to admit our faults and sins to others, but if we make that conscious choice to allow a godly person in our life to point out these problematic areas, then we can begin or continue to walk in the way God intended us to walk.

Strong, close relationships are a key to experiencing the abundant blessings the Lord has always wanted to pour out on us. Jesus said, “I have come that they may have life and have it more abundantly” (John 10:10). Start looking for Paul, Barnabas and Timothy in your life today – not only will you be a blessing to them, but they will be a blessing to you in ways beyond what you can imagine.

HOPE

Why is there so much confusion about the true nature of hope? One reason is because hope, like faith and love, looks different in different situations.

In 1 Corinthians 13:13, the apostle Paul wrote, “But now faith, hope, love, abide these three; but the greatest of these is love.” These three great pillars of joyful living are all critical, but all three adapt appropriately to changing conditions.

In times of abundance, faith can express trust in God by smiling with grateful humility. In times of loss, it will grieve – but not like people without hope (1 Thessalonians 4:13). As it works, faith can express itself through great effort and urgency. At rest, it can relax in the presence of the One who says, “cease striving and know that I am God” (Psalm 46:10).

Love too is adaptable. To seek the good of others, sometimes it must be gentle and patient. At other times, it must be firm – even tough.

Likewise hope can flex to fit to various situations. Because it relies on the goodness and faithfulness of God, it has many faces to respond fully to the different experiences of life.

Paul noted that hope is *courageous*: “Having such a hope, we use great boldness in our speech” (2 Corinthians 3:12). He also said that hope is *patient*: “We give thanks to God always for all of you... constantly bearing in mind your work of faith and labor of love and steadfastness of hope in our Lord Jesus Christ in the

presence of our God and Father” (1 Thessalonians 1:2-3).

Hope is *expectant*: We are “looking for the blessed hope and the appearing of the glory of our great God and Savior, Christ Jesus, who gave himself for us to redeem us from every lawless deed, and to purify for himself a people for his own possession, zealous for good deeds” (Titus 2:13-14).

Hope is remarkably *versatile*. With hope, followers of Christ can confidently engage the world. Genuine hope will strengthen us for the wide variety of challenges we face because we see those challenges through the lens of God’s character.

THE TEN COMMANDMENTS ARE MEANT TO ENRICH YOU, NOT TO ENSLAVE YOU

Sometimes we need to take a step back from our lives and evaluate whether or not God is our true hub. Is HE really first – not in the sense that there are other things on our list, but in the sense that HE’S the center of our existence. Be careful how you answer!!! Is God REALLY first? Or do you have other “gods” that have taken his rightful place? Perhaps your job has taken God’s place; or your possessions; or your spouse; or your parents; or your children? Oh, yes, we can rationalize putting other things before God in very pious terms, but the first commandment, not suggestion, says, “You shall have no other gods before me” (Exodus 20:3). Can it be more plain?

How often we all fall short! And what about the rest of the commandments. Do you even remember what they are? Maybe it would be good to self-check on all TEN. Remember where they are? – Exodus 20. And while you’re at it, how about self-checking on what Jesus said was the GREATEST COMMANDMENT and the Second, which is like it! And if you’re having trouble knowing what that LOVE looks like, let the apostle Paul help. Re-read 1 Corinthians 13. I know, many of us memorized it as kids, but take a good hard look at your life as it relates to true love. Study verses 4-8 in particular to see whether you love like that, and then remember that Jesus’ love took him willingly to the cross to DIE for sinners (Yes, sinners – that’s you and me). We have been deceived by the evil one into believing that love is how we feel– but it is NOT – it is a decision of the will to “bear all things...”

You CAN yield to the Holy Spirit and begin to make God your ONLY God. And, guess what, when you do you will know real freedom!
