FOR WHOM SHOULD I VOTE?

(Because you have asked, here are some thoughts regarding how Christians should approach the upcoming elections)

America remains at a crossroads of huge importance. Much is dependent upon the way she chooses to go. In just a few months, we will be going to the polls to choose a new President and other leaders. And many people are asking "For whom should I vote?"

Given the current presumptive candidates for the highest office, Hillary Clinton and Donald Trump, that is a perplexing question for neither candidate is entirely pleasing. However, we should not make our selection on the basis of the personalities of those running for office. This is NOT a popularity contest, or, it should not be. That's how we picked the candidate we would support when we were in grade school. Frankly, being the first in any category to run for office should not influence our thinking either. As responsible adult Christians we should choose the candidates we support on the basis of that for which they stand. In this election, that, too, is difficult for one candidate is presented as an irresponsible hot head and the other clearly bends the truth irresponsibly. So, we are forced to look for principles beyond the candidates themselves. In this election, the principles are found in the "platforms" of their parties. For example: the platform of the Democrat party supports abortion on demand. They argue that a woman should be free to kill a child conceived in her womb if she does not want it. The platform of the Republican party defends the right of the unborn to life.

In his book *The Mystery of the Shemitah*, Rabbi Jonathan Cahn says this, "If God is not sovereign over the land and its people,

then the land and its people become cut off from the Creator. A god-centered worldview is replaced by a man-centered or self-centered worldview... God is driven out so that people become their own gods, masters of the land, their world, and their destiny. They rewrite the law and redefine what is right and wrong, moral and immoral.

Without God nothing would be holy, or for that matter, unholy. Nothing has any purpose except the purpose they now assign it. And with no true purpose, they could do whatever they wanted...not only with their land but also with their lives, with each other, and with their children. Thus, they lifted up their children as sacrifices on the altars of foreign gods.

It was for this last transgression that judgment fell...Israel offered their sons and daughters in the fires of Baal and Molech and that sin brought the nation's destruction."

For me, the baseline for all moral decisions remains the Bible. Until recently, that was true for our nation as well. But today, America has drifted away from that position. America no longer has a God-centered worldview. We now have a man-centered or self-centered worldview. Romans 1:21-32 gives us a description of a nation which has turned away from God and made self the determinate of right and wrong.

For although they knew God, they neither glorified him as God nor gave thanks to him, but their thinking became futile and their foolish hearts were darkened. Although they claimed to be wise, they became fools and exchanged the glory of the immortal God for images made to look like mortal man and birds and animals and reptiles.

Therefore God gave them over in the sinful desires of their hearts to sexual impurity for the degrading of their bodies with one another. They exchanged the truth of God for a lie, and worshiped and served created things rather than the Creator – who is forever praised. Amen.

Because of this, God gave them over to shameful lusts. Even their women exchanged natural relations for unnatural ones. In the same way the men also abandoned natural relations with women and were inflamed with lust for one another. Men committed indecent acts with other men, and received in themselves the due penalty for their perversion.

Furthermore, since they did not think it worthwhile to retain the knowledge of God, he gave them over to a depraved mind, to do what ought not to be done. They have become filled with every kind of wickedness, evil, greed and depravity. They are full of envy, murder, strife, deceit and malice. They are gossips, slanderers, God-haters, insolent, arrogant and boastful; they invent ways of doing evil; they disobey their parents; they are senseless, faithless, heartless, ruthless. Although they know God's righteous decree that those who do such things deserve death, they not only continue to do these very things but also approve of those who practice them.

It is amazing to read the Romans' passage, for, unfortunately, it sounds like it is describing our nation today. Like ancient Israel, we have chosen to drive God out. Now, free from any restraint applied by God, we can do what we want to do with our land, our lives and our children. We can even justify killing others if they oppose us or if their conception is inconvenient. But our change of position about right and wrong, moral and immoral changes nothing! Right and wrong, moral and immoral is still determined by God and is found in God's word. It is as wrong to kill others

and our children today as it was in Bible days. And God's judgment is the same!

Since 1973, (Roe v Wade) 57,762,169 "legal" abortions have been performed in the United States. That is 1.3 million abortions each year or 3,562 abortions each day. How displeased God must be with a nation that disregards his holy word and redefines morality so as to allow its mothers to kill their children as their right! If God judged Israel, his chosen nation, and sent her into exile for seventy years for this crime, how can the United States, or any other nation, hope to avoid his wrath if they permit the same sinful behavior?

The fall of God's judgment is always preceded by warnings to the people on whom judgment is about to fall. These warnings come as smaller judgments: plagues, natural disasters, economic downturns, etc. If the smaller judgments are ignored and the people of the nation do not repent of their error and return to God, the final judgment comes.

This election is an opportunity for America to repent of her error and return to God and his word. If the nation chooses to vote for an abortionist or for the party that defends a woman's right to kill her unborn child (to murder her child), the warning judgments which God has sent to us: economic problems, new diseases, terrorist attacks, etc., will be ignored and the nation will move closer to final judgment and collapse. So, in this election, we have an important choice to make which has nothing to do with Hillary or Donald. We can vote for a party which supports an increasingly self-centered worldview which is devoid of God, or we can vote for a party which supports a more God-centered worldview. This election is too important for us to vote on the basis of the candidates' personalities. What is at stake are the principles which will guide our national future.

CALLED TO FOLLOW

He certainly wasn't one of society's so-called "beautiful people," flying around in his private jet to the world's exotic spots to have his picture taken with others of the jet set. Nor was he a maker of global political news. Now was he to be counted among the world's richest. Quite the opposite. He was one whose life and work put him at the other end of the social scale. He was despised by his neighbors and acquaintances. To use Biblical words, he was an outcast and a sinner. He had no cause whatsoever to expect that a generation or so after his death he would be at all remembered, let alone be remembered with warmth and thanksgiving. He was, after all, a man who had volunteered to serve in a dirty and dishonest public position, and people like that don't receive notice in the annals of public history. Yet, he is not a forgotten man in human history, and his recorded words have been given a unique prominence in our world's literature. By now you know of whom I speak: Matthew, disciple of Jesus, and author of the first of the New Testament Gospels.

You and I are kin to this man, Matthew. In the grace of God he truly is, for us, one of the earth's "beautiful people." Our forefathers in the Christian faith long ago accorded him the esteemed title, "Saint." God gave him the talent to write a record of earth-shaking events, and for the sake of the Gospel, Matthew did so. It should make us feel good to have information like that about our kinfolk. We all like to know we are related to real "winners." And Matthew – no question about it – was a winner. Let's take a close look at how this socially-certified "loser" became a winner.

The biographical record of the transformation is very brief. It

takes less than one New Testament verse for Matthew to recount the history: "... (Jesus) saw a man called Matthew sitting at the tax office; and he said to him, 'Follow me'." There, you have heard it all, every word that was written in the opening chapter of the biography of one whom we gladly name as our kinsman. It is a sketchy history, to be sure. It doesn't provide the details we might like to have, curious people as we are about our ancestors, but it must suffice. (Until we enter heaven, our questions about this and other similar matters will remain unanswered, and once we are in heaven. I presume we will have better things to do with our time and energy than chase Matthew in order to get from him the colorful details of his history.) You see, to read the rest of Matthew's Gospel about Jesus Christ, the Savior of the world, is to realize that that former tax collector - even in this first chapter of a long story of disciples and following Jesus - was most concerned to tell others the incredible news of Jesus who, contrary to all popular expectations invites sinners and outcasts into his fellowship. If we truly understand the circumstances of a tax collector in that old world, it is surprising, it is astonishing, it is beyond belief to hear that Jesus would dare to approach a Matthew and invite him into a godly fellowship. And that is precisely the amazing grace which underlies that short autobiographical note with which the gospel begins: that Jesus the Messiah should invite sinners to join him in the love and work of God; and even more that that, that by the simple call of God in Christ sinners become sons and daughters of God!

That kind of information, that good news stretches beyond the range of ordinary belief and imagination. That, however, is the very nature of the Gospel! The grace of the almighty and all-holy God reaches out to embrace even the most unworthy. How incredible that love which occasions the invitation to be followers and disciples!

The invitation is declared to all the Matthews of this world so simply: "Follow me." Jesus doesn't set down a list is prerequisites to be met before we answer his calling. And he doesn't go on to announce that now that you have responded to the invitation, you will receive a thick book containing page after page of instructions and regulations for all who intend to be his followers. He simply says: "Follow me,"... and then waits to see what happens.

What happens is this: as we become his followers, we soon learn that he leads us into a new life and way of living. In God's wonderful way of working, we become more and more attached to him whom we follow, namely the person of God's Son, Jesus. That attachment, that "marriage," that union produces its own results. Attitudes, for example, are changed. The ways in which we are willing to expend time and energy of our pocketbooks is transferred. Old ways and old obsessions are put to death, and new ways of looking and hearing and thinking and living are brought to life. Sometimes in Christian experience the hearing of the invitation and its responses are abrupt; sometimes the whole experience is so gradual in taking place that the realization that we are on the course of following Jesus comes almost as a surprise. But regardless of how it happens or has happened in your life, know this: the invitation to follow the Lord Jesus Christ embodies within itself the power to fill your life with the joy of sin forgiven and the certainty of being about God's business forever. We confess that our following is day-by-day by faith only, but that same faith hears and believes the promise: "Lo, I am with you always." Rejoice, for you are called!

HOW WELL DO YOU WORSHIP?

(From Bridges for Peace Israel Teaching Letter)

The worship of the Lord involves much more than going to a service where we sing some songs and hear the preaching of the Word. Worshiping God is a lifestyle that encompasses our whole being, day in and day out – what we say, what we do, and most importantly, how we do it. Praise and worship is the highest form of thanksgiving that one can offer. The Hebrew language helps us to understand the full dimension of what our praise and worship should be.

Hallel: means to boast, rave or celebrate clamorously.

Psalm 44:8 - *In God we make our boast (hallel) all the day long.* **Todah**: means thanks, but also from the root for hand, means to extend the hands in adoration.

Psalm 50:23 - He who sacrifices thank offerings (todah) to Me honors Me, and prepares the way so that I may show him the salvation of God.

Barach: means to bend the knee, to bow low, to empower for success, blessing.

Psalm 103:1 - Praise (barach) the Lord, O my soul.

Shabach: means shout, mirth and loud adoration offered with an unashamed voice.

Psalm 117:1 Praise the Lord all you nations, extol (shabach) Him, all you peoples.

Teruah: means a shout as at the walls of Jericho but also the long loud sound that the shofar (ram's horn) makes.

Psalm 89:15 - Blessed are all those who have learned to acclaim (teruah) You...

Hishtachavey: means worship in the act of bowing oneself down in awe of the Lord in submission. Generally a quiet act.

Genesis 22:5 - He said to his servants, 'Stay here with the donkey while the boy and I go over there. We will worship (hishtachavey) and then we will come back to you.

Gil: means to turn around, spin, dance in exuberant joy.

Zephaniah 3:17 - The Lord your God is mighty in your midst; He will save. He will rejoice over you with joy. He will rest in His love. He rejoices (ya-GIL-elyeick) over you with a joyful shout.

FORGIVENESS THROUGH THE CROSS

The crucifixion has been called "the best-known fact in the life of Jesus." The only words of Jesus from the cross recorded by Mark and Matthew were the first line of Psalm 22:1 in Aramaic or Hebrew: "My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?" There are two main interpretations of this word from the cross. One is that it was a cry of temporary desolation as Jesus stood upon the threshold of death. A second is that it was an appeal to God in which the Son of God identified himself with the psalmist in his terrifying complaint of being deserted by the Father. It should be recalled that the entire psalm was very familiar to Jesus. He well knew that the psalmist went on to express assurance that God who seemingly had forsaken him would surely answer his desperate need in his hour of suffering. Whatever be the interpretation, two facts are certain. One is that Jesus' cry from the cross revealed the awful loneliness of his suffering on behalf of mankind. The other is that the cry of his humanity never dimmed his consciousness of God. He might have despaired in his solitary endurance of the cross, but he never denied God.

Few passages reveal so clearly the awfulness of sin in its rebellion against God That the sinless Son of God should be nailed to a cross, taunted by wicked men, and left to die alone like a murderer was the fullest unveiling of the heinousness of man's darkened heart.

Luke does not refer to this word from the cross. Instead, he records another which epitomizes the forgiveness of a merciful and loving God: "Father, forgive them; for they know not what they do" (Luke 23:34). Although these words do not appear in some of the older manuscripts, their inclusion in our New Testament is certainly in complete keeping with the nature of Jesus Christ. This is the kind of God with whom we deal, one whose love is great enough to breathe a prayer for forgiveness for his enemies in the hour of his greatest suffering.

The taunt which some of the religious rulers flaunted at Jesus, "He saved others; let him save himself" (Luke 23:35), reveals a profound observation concerning the arrogance of mankind. Actually, however, it unveils more about God than about man. For while, on the surface, it seems to indicate a weakness in God, it really says much about his omnipotence. There are many things in this world which God cannot do without contradicting himself. He cannot stop wars until men and women are ready to stop them. He cannot keep the evil of men from hurting those who are innocent. He does not force himself into the hearts of people. He waits in solemn majesty and dignity to be admitted by those who will receive him. His ways are not our ways; his kingdom is not like the kingdoms of this world; his kind of power is not like the power of the mighty of earth. In his death on the cross he fulfilled in his own life the principle which he taught: Except a seed fall into the ground and die, it can bear no fruit.

What shall it profit a man if he gain the whole world, and lose his own soul? Greater love hath no man than this, that he lay down his life for his friend.

With Jesus on Calvary were two malefactors who were crucified with him. Their crosses cause us to remember that the wicked of this world are punished. They throw into stark reality the suffering of the innocent Savior. And when one of the thieves, who was deeply involved in the world of sin, repented of his evil life and looked to Jesus for salvation, the real meaning of Calvary became evident. For Jesus' reply was a full pardon: "Verily I say unto thee, Today you shall be with me in paradise" (Luke 23:43). From that moment until now, this word from the cross has assured sinners of forgiveness no matter how deeply they have sinned.

Not long after this act of grace, the Savior cried with a loud voice: "Father, into thy hands I commend my spirit" (Luke 23:46). And saying this, he breathed his last. How fitting that the sufferings of our Lord on the cross should have ended in such triumph over sin. Even in his death, he identified himself with humanity, assuring a humble thief that he should be united with him that day in paradise.

The transforming power of Christ's suffering was evident even before he died. We have noted already the redemption of the dying thief. We marvel at the testimony of the centurion, a Roman, who saw in Jesus "a righteous man," or as Mark reported his word, "The Son of God".

Further evidence of the transforming power of his suffering may be inferred from the witness of Joseph of Arimathea. Here was a man who was a ruler of the Jews, a person of prominence, and one who did not vote with the others to condemn the Savior. It required genuine courage for him to go to Pilate and request the body of Jesus for burial. Certainly, his act demonstrated the power of Christ at work in his life.

We learn from this account of our Lord's suffering and death on the cross a very important truth. It is that the cross forces men and women to a response, either for or against Christ. It is little wonder that the events of Calvary and the resurrection divide history into two eras — before Christ and after Christ. They constitute the watershed which separates the time of despair from the time of hope, the time of judgment from the time of grace.

The strange power of Christ's suffering has caused men to turn from cursing the cross to kneeling before it in complete obedience to the Christ through whom they have found forgiveness and the love of God. No finer symbol of the hope of the world is to be found than that instrument of torture and death upon which Jesus hung on Calvary's hill. In his suffering for mankind lies the one hope of the world for peace, for it brings into the lives of all who respond to it the experience of being loved by God. Men and women then come to know how to love their neighbors. It is therefore the only effective way by which men and women learn how to become peacemakers, people of good will, the children of God.

A PRESCRIPTION FROM THE GREAT PHYSICIAN

Read this prescription aloud three times a day.

Why three times a day? Did you ever take medication from a doctor only once or twice and stop it? If you did, you know that the medication did not work because you should have finished the prescription for it to be fully effective. The same is true of God's healing. There is great power in voicing these truths repeatedly.

Death and life (disease and health) are in the power of the tongue. Proverbs 18:21

The more you verbalize these truths, the more they will become part of your spiritual being. Remember, God wants you to enjoy health.

And the Lord will take away from you all illness.

Deuteronomy 7:15

God does not give disease or punish with illness. God's desire is for us to be healthy.

Bless the Lord, oh my soul; and all that is within me, bless his holy name!

Bless the Lord, oh my soul; and forget not all his benefits; who forgives all of your iniquities, who heals all your diseases, who redeems your life from destruction, who crowns you with loving kindness and tender mercies, who satisfies your desires with good things; so that your youth is renewed like the eagles.

Surely he has borne our griefs (sickness) and carried our sorrows (pains)... and by his stripes (wounds) we are healed. Isaiah 53:4-5

A PRAYER FOR HEALING

Almighty and loving Father; you gave your beloved Son for our redemption and healing. Deeply imbedded in his wounds are all of our disease, all of our pain, all of our sorrows.
